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From time to time I meet people who no longer attend church like they once did when they lived in another part of the country. "We've been here for quite some time," they say, "and we've visited almost every church in town. There just isn't a church like the one we attended where we used to live."

Life is constantly changing. Each change produces certain anxieties and awkwardness. For example, most people feel apprehensive the first few days on a new job.
